- 27 May The anniversary of the 1967 referendum. This gave the Commonwealth the power to make laws for Aboriginal people and for Aboriginal people to be recognised in the national census.
- 3 June Mabo decision. The High Court of Australia decided that terra nullius should not have been applied to Australia. The decision recognised that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have rights to the land. The case was led by Torres Strait Islander man, the late Eddie (Koiki) Mabo.

National Reconciliation Week is an opportunity to celebrate the unique culture and history of Aboriginal people. Reconciliation Australia's theme for 2022, *Be Brave. Make Change*, urges the reconciliation movement towards braver and more impactful action.

Tuesday week 7 (June 14) is a student free day where staff will participate in professional learning focussed on our site improvement plan

Year 4 Spelling and Vocabulary



computerphobe meaning: A person who experiences anxiety about computers, especially about their use.

In a sentence:

People who are considered computerphoebes dislike using computers.

Kyrofelonoshophobia

meaning: A strong fear or dislike of cartoon characters.

In a sentence: Lyla asked, "what is the fear of cartoon characters called?" and we googled it and the answer was Kyrofelonoshophobia.



This year the year 4 class has used a different approach to spelling. Becoming familiar with morphology and etymology of words has a number of useful applications to both reading and writing.

Knowing the etymology of words helps to figure out their most effective use. Understanding the original meaning of a word as well as how it's been used in both the past and present can increase your comprehension of its nuances and connotation. This knowledge will help you differentiate between words that have similar uses or are closely related to each other and allow you to choose the best one for each situation, leading to more masterful use of those words within your writing.

Each week, the year 4 class have worked with words with either the same prefixes and suffixes. We use the iPads to find the meaning and then make our own sentences to demonstrate our understanding. This is an example of some of learning when were learning about words with the suffix 'phobia.'



ophidiophobia meaning: Is an extreme overwhelming fear of snakes.

In a sentence:

Ophidiophobia is one of the most common and intense phobias among humans, about two-thirds of adults are scared of snakes.


