Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) update

This year, Governing Council investigated starting an OSHC service at PBAS. A survey was conducted to better understand the needs of our community. We received 26 responses that gave us a better understanding of the number of children that would access before school, after school and vacation care. Governing Council discussed the responses and elected to continue to the procurement process in the hopes of finding an approved provider to establish and run an OSHC service at PBAS.

We completed an acquisition plan and service specifications which were sent to approved OSHC providers and they were invited to submit a tender for the service. Unfortunately, we received no tenders. The OSHC providers stated that the main reasons for not tendering were financial unviability and not having enough staff to operate a service at PBAS.

Governing Council are disappointed that we will not have an OSHC service in the near future. However, we will continue to remain open to establishing a service should any circumstances change.

Keeping Safe: Child Protection Curriculum (KS:CPC)

The Department for Education Child protection in schools, early childhood education and care services policy states that 'all children and young people in the department's preschools and schools will access the approved child protection curriculum'.

The KS:CPC teaches children and young people to recognise abuse, tell a trusted adult, understand what is appropriate and inappropriate touching and ways of keeping themselves safe.

Themes

The curriculum is based on two main themes which are presented through topics and activities.

- Theme 1: We all have the right to be safe
- Theme 2: We can help ourselves to be safe by talking to people we trust.

Focus Areas

The two themes are explored through four Focus Areas, which are examined in growing complexity in accordance with the age of the learners.

1. The right to be safe
2. Relationships
3. Recognising and reporting abuse
4. Protective strategies.

Our students will be undertaking the KS: CPC and many ask some questions at home.
